This 4-year overlapping cycle enables continuity, support, and a gradual learning curve for the incoming president.

Honours Scholarships

Each year our region awards scholarships valued at \$1500 to students doing a fourth or honours year in statistics, mathematical statistics, biostatistics, bioinformatics or biometrics. This year there were 10 applicants, and the winners were:

- Davis McCarthy (University of Melbourne) who has been working at the Walter and Eliza Hall Institute (through the Undergraduate Research Opportunities Programme) on improving statistical methods for the analysis of microarray experiments. His Honours project is on methods for the analysis of NextGen sequencing data.
- Georgina Davies (University of Queensland) who is undertaking the fourth year of a
 double degree, and has been involved in projects with the School of Animal Studies at
 UQ modelling the growth of koalas, and with the Australian Defence Science and
 Technology Organisation.

The panel was able to say to both of these students: "We can see that you are clearly one of the top honours/4th year statistics students in Australia and New Zealand, and your prospects for a career in Biometrics and Biostatistics are strong". We wish Davis and Georgina well in the future.
